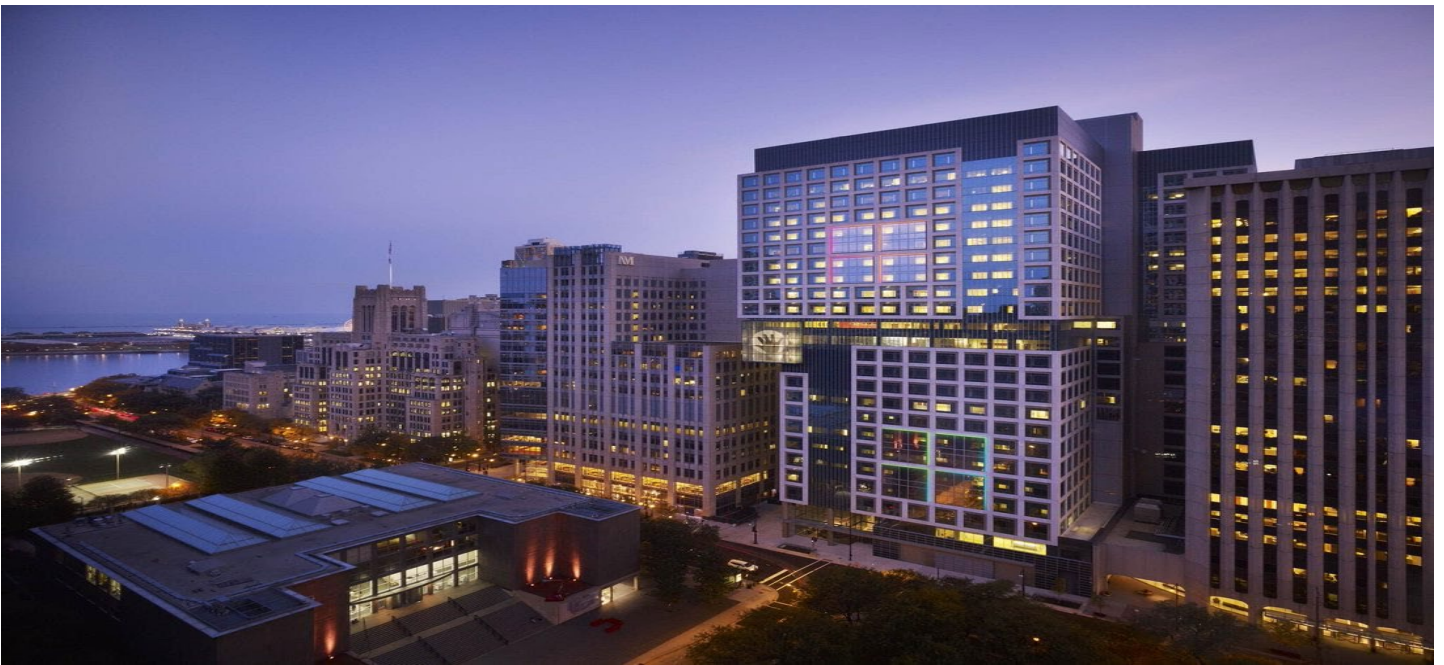




Postdoctoral Fellowship with the Center for Childhood Resilience

2023 - 2024



The Center for Childhood Resilience

The Center for Childhood Resilience (CCR) in the Pritzker Department of Psychiatry and Behavioral Health at Ann & Robert H. Lurie Children's Hospital of Chicago is recruiting for **a full-time 2- year postdoctoral fellowship beginning July, 2024.** CCR is committed to increasing access to high quality mental health services and prevention programming for youth throughout Illinois and nationwide. This commitment is achieved through professional development, innovation, investigation, and advocacy. CCR's multi-disciplinary teams collaborate with schools and other youth serving organizations in historically marginalized and under-resourced communities to provide trainings, consultation, supported implementation, advocacy, policy reform, and research that advances mental health services and builds strong communities. CCR engages in a range of training activities at the prevention, early intervention and intensive, targeted intervention levels to prepare adults working with youth to provide appropriate social-emotional supports for children and adolescents struggling to meet the challenges of everyday life. Examples of these supports include helping schools develop behavioral health teaming structures to support appropriate referrals and linkage to mental health supports, training coaches to implement programs promoting early relational health in preschools, and training social workers and counselors to provide empirically supported group interventions that address trauma, anxiety, behavioral struggles, and stress related to immigration in kindergarten through 12th grade. CCR team members also serve on many city and state task forces and committees to implement public policy in support of youth mental health.

Postdoctoral Fellowship

Recruitment is for a post-doctoral fellow with primary interests **either** in early childhood **or** in school mental health (kindergarten through 12th grade), although engagement in training activities can certainly be arranged in both spaces. The post-doctoral fellow in CCR generally stays for 2 years although the initial commitment is for one year with the second year based on mutual agreement. Fellows devote approximately 60% of their time during the first year to CCR activities and 40% to clinical outpatient activities in the Pritzker Department of Child Psychiatry and Behavioral Sciences. CCR activities include training in implementation science, school- and community consultation, and engagement in at least one school-based empirically supported group intervention. Fellows are encouraged to develop research ideas and participate in CCR scholarship and to engage in advocacy and policy activities. Clinical outpatient activities might include specialized training in early childhood, anxiety, depression, ADHD, suicide prevention, trauma, or any number of other areas. Fellows will have the opportunity to specialize in areas of interest. Ample supervision aligned with licensure in clinical psychology is provided. Multiple professional development opportunities exist including but not limited to participation in 1) a student led brown bag series for CCR as well as CCR research, staff development, and race and equity meetings, 2) a monthly Postdoctoral Professional Development Seminar with all department psychology fellows, and 3) a year-long supervision training seminar including supervised supervision of Northwestern University practicum students. Fellows have access to a variety of multidisciplinary educational offerings through the department, Lurie Children's, and Northwestern University. The second year of the post-doctoral fellowship includes a larger percentage of time devoted to CCR activities with further development of the Fellow's own research and training interests. Clinical time during the second year is geared towards completing the necessary hours for Illinois licensure.

Qualified applicants will have a PhD/PsyD in psychology from an APA- or CPA-approved graduate program and completion of an APA-accredited pre-doctoral internship. Preference is given to applicants from APA-accredited clinical programs who have extensive training in both clinical and research areas of child psychology.

Benefits

Salary is commensurate with NIH guidelines. As employees of Ann & Robert H. Lurie Children's Hospital of Chicago, all fellows receive a competitive benefits package including medical, dental, and vision coverage including 22 personal days off, seven national holidays, and five professional leave days (conferences, job interviews). Fellows may request reimbursement of up to \$750 annually to support attendance and presentations at national conferences. Our fellows are supported by an administrative assistant who assists with scheduling, nonclinical patient communication, and a variety of other administrative tasks. Ann & Robert H. Lurie Children's Hospital of Chicago requires that all new employees must undergo and pass drug testing before employment begins. The preferred start date is July 1 but is flexible.

The Institution

Our training program is located within Ann & Robert H. Lurie Children's Hospital of Chicago, a 350+ bed pediatric tertiary care hospital on Northwestern University's downtown campus. It is the pediatric training facility for the Feinberg School of Medicine and as a major teaching and treatment center it attracts a diverse patient population from all socioeconomic classes in Chicago, its suburbs, and surrounding states. The Pritzker Department of Psychiatry and Behavioral Sciences offers comprehensive mental health care to children and families through Outpatient Services, the Consult Service, the Partial Hospitalization Program, the Inpatient Psychiatry Unit, and a range of specialized programs in pediatric, clinical child, and community mental health services. We are a growing multidisciplinary department of psychiatry, social work and over 40 psychologists. Considerable staff time and facilities are invested throughout the institution in the training of students from many disciplines.

Application Process

Applications will be reviewed as received and must be received on or before December 20, 2023 for full consideration. Applicants should submit 1) a cover letter detailing relevant training and experiences and your postdoctoral professional development goals, 2) an updated curriculum vitae, and 3) two letters of recommendation. The letters of recommendation may be sent with the application or separately by the letter writer.
